Over the course of the last few months, we have had hundreds of responses to our industry-wide survey.


Designers from the likes of Dyson, Samsung, Shark Ninja and many others have got involved. Agency owners to design directors have also taken the time to share their take on 2020.

2021.

0-2 years



Year 0-2

We all remember our humble beginnings.

Our first entry on the ladder.

For the sake of too much granular detail, we've packaged this up as the early inroads to your career.

You notice after 2 years of craft, the portfolio is in better shape and hopefully you might have some product to market.

London: £23,000 - £30,000

Bristol: £21,000 - £28,000

Cambridge: £22,000 - £28,000

Oxford: £22,000 - £28,000

Other: £20,000 - £26,000

Freelance: £150 - £200 per day

*The lower figure is where you are most likely at in Year 0.
The higher figure is where you are most likely at in Year 2
Freelance depends on a variety of factors, but 175 is your average.

- + You are now after 2 years in a much better shape for salaries to increase.
- + Certain employers do pay more, however expect potential stagnation in years 3-4. Your next move could be a sideways one financially.
- + Certain product verticals, such as medical, will demand slightly higher salaries.

3-6 years



Year 3-6

At this point you either speak only through NDAs, or start to drop the ball on your design instagram page as work takes centre stage.

Stereotypically, you are now a safe pair of hands.

Now you are at a place where you feel a creative comfort with your craft, but opportunities will arise in all different shapes and sizes. London: £30,000 - £48,000

Bristol: £26,000 - £42,000 (this will rise!!)

Cambridge: £28,000 - £48,000

Oxford: £26,000 - £42,000

Other: £24,000 - £35,000

Freelance: £200 - 350 per day

*The lower figure is where you are most likely at in Year 3.
The higher figure is where you are most likely at in Year 6
Freelance depends on a variety of factors, but 275 is your average.

- + Salary **should never** be your main priority, but this will become more of a focus. We all have bills to pay.
- + What you start to see now is these ranges expanding, particularly in the design hubs. The most common number on our survey was £32,000.
- + A time to think about becoming a specialist? Go in-house, agency, startup, overseas? Make yourself more well-rounded.
- + Remote working / hybrid working is more likely to be on the table from this point onwards.
- + There is a huge medical focus to Cambridge, so whilst salaries are similar to London, the diversity of roles is not.

6-10 yrs (Senior/Principal Design)



Year 6-10

Congratulations, you have the t-shirt.

You are facing some new choices here. Where do I go? Does the opportunity internally match my ambition?

Is it time to do something new, think about management, but I also might have other things to consider?

Family. Mortgage. How many years have I got left before the youth mobility visa runs out for Oz?

In busy times, the world is your oyster.

London: £42,000 - £70,000

Bristol: £35,000 - £55,000

Cambridge: £40,000 - £65,000

Oxford: £35,000 - £55,000

Other: £28,000 - £45,000

Freelance: £350 - 500 per day

- + As stated before, certain product verticals like medical, electric vehicles, certain domestic appliances brands pay well.
- + Whilst base salaries can be high in startups, what it lacks can be a benefits package, comprehensive pension etc. It all factors into this swing you are seeing. The BIG focus is shares, however they can quite quickly become worthless.
- + Cambridge is predominantly medical.
- + The most common number from our survey was £50,000
- + Whilst these numbers will look high for some, it is nothing in comparison to what you can earn at our digital counterparts.

Design Manager



Design Manager

Management.

You have been thrown in as you have been around the design block a few times, or it just seemed the logical next step to you.

Welcome to meetings about meetings, budgets, endless speculative approaches from recruiters and two new words in your vocabulary: stakeholder management.

London: £42,000 - £70,000

Bristol: £35,000 - £55,000

Cambridge: £40,000 - £65,000

Oxford: £35,000 - £55,000

Other: £28,000 - £45,000

Freelance: £400 - 600 per day

- + Management can come before 6 years. Again, there is no granular detail here.
- + I would argue Principal designers earn as much as managers, as it takes a company of a certain size to facilitate that kind of hire. You would associate it with a bigger player in the market.
- + I would associate the higher end of this scale to corps, and the lower end to SMEs that have a manager and a few juniors.
- +This role can be less about hands-on design, but more about facilitating and nurturing the team.

London: £65,000 +

Bristol: £55,000 +

Cambridge: £65,000 +

Oxford: £55,000 +

Other: £50,000 +

Freelance: £650 +


*Freelance depends on a variety of factors, .

- + Job titles are ambiguous. At this point you could be a Head of Product Development, Head of Design, VP of Design, CDO.
- + One thing to note is that at this point, it's beyond salary. There is so much more at play here with bonuses, shares, incentives. It would be wrong of us to dig deep into that.
- + There can only be one of these in the entire business.
- + We have found work for a VP in London within consumer electronics at something like £180,000 per year. You start to see exceptions to the rule when you can demonstrate unparalleled value to a business.
- + The most common number on our survey was £60,000

The formula.

Sydney

Salaries are highest in Sydney. With living costs comparable to London, it is the most expensive city in Australia. Expensive for a reason though: an awesome place to be.

X Melbourne

Melbourne is a growing hub, but salaries still sit at 10% lower than Sydney. An artsy hub & tremendous vibe.

X Other

Like always, there is life outside the big cities. In certain product verticals like medical, salaries will still be comparable to Melbourne, although again 5-10% lower in other areas.

0-2 years



Year 0-2

Our first entry on the ladder.

For the sake of too much granular detail, we've packaged this up as the early inroads to your career.

You notice after 2 years of craft, the portfolio is in better shape and hopefully you might have some product to market.

Sydney: \$50,000 - \$65,000

Melbourne: \$45,000 - \$60,000

Other: \$42,000 - \$55,000

Freelance: c\$35 per hour

- + AUD to GDP = 1 to 0.55
- + Industrial Design in Australia is far more all-encompassing than in the UK. Greater focus on design for manufacturing for example.
- + Most employers will want you to be in the country as a sign of investment before sponsoring.

3-6 years
